A RENAISSANCE IS RUMBLING





The Haight-Ashbury Free Clinic, founded by Dr. Dave in 1967, is celebrating its 54th anniversary on June 6. In collaboration with HealthRIGHT360, a virtual benefit concert -- "Black Tie & Tie Dye" -- will be held to help thousands of low-income people, many without housing.

We had the honor and joy of hanging and chatting with Dr. Dave recently at his home office in the Haight. Here are a few hightlights from our conversation.

Dr. Dave: [about the benefit concert]: We've got some of the old bands together because our clinic was built on rock and roll. We were too radical for tradional funding, so we're going to have this celebration.

Haight Street Voice: As Bill Graham did with you ...

DD: Exactly.

HSV: How do you feel about the condition of Haight Street now since covid -- all the boarded up windows and shops? Thank god for the SF Heritage who is taking care of the corner building on Haight-Ashbury and a couple of the shops there. You lived through the whole early 1970s when

everything got really ugly. You were there. Was it very similar to today's situation?

Dr. Dave: I walk down there now and I have memories of the Grateful Dead playing on a flatbed truck in the Panhandle. It was crazy but it was vibrant with art and culture. Now you go down there and it's just sad. I hate to see that unhealthy lifestyle. I think it's a public health hazard to not have toilets for the street. It also hurts the businesses.

There's a culture and a vibrancy here and you

[hopefully] transmit that to the next generation. I hope what will happen is that will continue on and things will come back.

HSV: What would you like to say to the community? **DD:** Preseve our history and culture, remember all the great things that come out of it -- but learn from the mistakes. I want the Haight to come back very much. Thank you!

HSV recently had the pleasure of interviewing Director Seth Eisen of EyeZen.org where he shared with us what inspired this project, "OUT of Site: Haight -Ashbury, a performance-driven queer history tour." Here are just a couple of excerpts from our en-

lightening conversation about SF counterculture -- from a perspective less traveled.

Seth Eisen: I've been studying queer history for 30 year and trying to make creative projects around it to bring those histories up because often they are lost ... except the ones that we know about, which are important, like

Harvey Milk. Where would we be in the movement -- especially in the Bay Area -- without Harvey's piece in it?

Haight Street Voice: And Norm Larson (who owned the Haight-Ashbury building and donated it as a National Treasure) was gay -- isn't that interesting!

SE: That's part of the story for sure! I love that nexus, the center of this piece is this historic building that was owned by a gay man, somebody who was really involved in the neighborhood. And I discovered in digging deeper that 7-10 gay bars were right here on Haight Street!

Like Goorbin's Hat store was a placed called Gus's Pub.

In the more radical politics of gay people, many of them died of AIDS. They were really on the front lines of fighting the good fight for the liberation of *all* people. And that's not just an idea of gay people; many people

in the different movements had those ideas -that *none* of us are free until *all* of us are free.




STREETPERSON SPOTLIGHT: COINS
